

# Use of Who and Which

- 'Who' is used in a 'relative clause' when we are talking about *people* (not things). We use 'who' instead of he, she or they.

Example: The artist **who** painted a picture of the Niagara Falls received an award.

- When talking about *things*, we use 'which' or 'that' in a relative clause.

Example: Where is the food **which** was in the fridge?
